Lisa Heintz, a parent of a student in Archway's Lower School, said her daughter grew and matured a lot during her years at Archway. "We will miss the staff at Archway the most – the one-on-one aides, teachers, therapists, everyone. Not only was it accommodating for my daughter but the school really cared about her as a person. Everyone in the school knew her well and staff communicated with me every step of the way. Before my daughter attended school at Archway, she really struggled making friends. At Archway, she learned how to form relationships and has made some great friendships with other students," said Heintz.

Upon graduation, each student leaves the Career Education Program with a fully completed resume, cover letter template and mock interview experience to aid in obtaining a job after graduation. Brooke Chmura, Careers Structured Learning Experience (SLE) Coordinator, said she and other teachers "walk alongside students and help them learn how to do life," including how to communicate well, safely travel around their communities, improve personal care and vocational skills, incorporate functional academics, and how to be responsible and active members of their communities. To further build skills, all students participate in multiple SLE and Community Based Instruction programs on and off-campus while in the Career Education Program. "I usually tell my students they should treat time at their on and off campus job sites as a job interview because it might end up with them in a paid position," she said. "I have had that happen with a handful of my students, which is super exciting for everyone," said Chmura.

Archway Programs has two schools serving special needs children, teens and young adults throughout New Jersey ages three through twenty-one years old. The Lower School has been in operation since the early 1960s and the Upper School was established in the early 1970s. Both schools are located in Waterford and Evesham Townships. Using a successful model unique to each school, children are provided with a safe, structured and compassionate atmosphere as Archway Programs' staff discovers and builds on each child's strengths and helps the kids overcome barriers by teaching coping and social skills. This includes providing students with the skills needed to successfully transition from school to adult life. Students learn skills that will gain them "real world" employment through Archway's Career Education Program, which enables them to overcome their challenges and learn in the classroom and on-the-job, skills necessary to transition from school-to-work and offers a number of vocational and career training opportunities to its students in both the Upper and Lower Schools. Students are given the opportunity to gain this experience by participating in on-campus, off-campus job samplings, cooperative education, sheltered workshop phrases, classroom instruction and job placement. It also gives students who cannot be placed into a vocational/trade school an option, providing work-readiness skills, increased social and independent skills gained in a work environment.
